Not being able to trace the young man and for reasons known to Mr. Davis himself, a warrant was sworn out for Story and Ritter, making the above charge. Just what is in the case is yet to be developed.

Work was made to have a court hearing today, but same has been postponed until better information can be had. The search still continues, by the officers and others.

VALDOSTA HIGH WINS GAME BY BIG SCORE

Thomasville Swamped 66 to 0. Visitors Were No Match for Husky Valdostans.

On Saturday the football team of the Valdosta high school ran away with the Thomasville high school team by the score of 66 to 0. Advance dope seemed to indicate that the game Saturday would be a good one and that the winner would be determined by not more than two touchdowns, but the Thomasville team did not come up to expectations and the Valdosta boys played much better ball than was expected of them. The result of the game was never in doubt and after the first three minutes of play, in which Valdosta scored the first touchdown, it was merely a question of how big a score Valdosta would make.

Only one time during the entire game did Thomasville threaten to score and that was early in the first quarter when they negotiated an end run of 20 yards. After this Thomasville made first down but once. The Thomasville team was equally as heavy as the Valdosta team but they had a very hazy knowledge of the game and were clearly outclassed.

Almost at will the Valdosta team would circle the ends or make long gains through the line. Time after time the Valdosta backs would gain from 10 to 30 yards on off tackle plays and the way they ran around the ends was a treat for even the most ardent Valdosta supporter.

Again James Cranford proved the star for Valdosta. He scored five touchdowns and but for the fact that the referee's whistle announced time up just before the ball was put in play for the last scrimmage, would have scored a sixth. Tom Cranford scored two touchdowns, Frank Rose one, West Cranford one and Louis Pindar one. The entire Valdosta team played excellent ball.

Thomasville had two or three good men and their work stood out as the only redeeming feature of the team play.

The Valdosta boys play Sparks Collegiate Institute next Saturday in Sparks and they are expecting a much better game.

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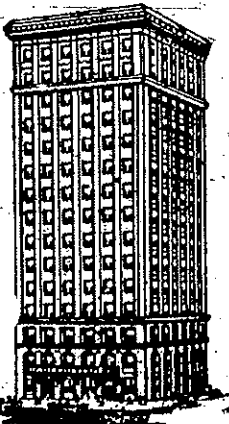
