

BULLDOGS SWAMP SYLVESTER ELEVEN 51 TO 0

YALE-GEORGIA GAME HOLDS CENTER OF ATTENTION TODAY

New York, Oct. 13 (AP)—The Yale-Georgia game at New Haven seems to hold forth the greatest possibilities of football fire works in today's Eastern calendar. Except for three points with the same line up that defeated the Elis in a seasonal game last year, 14 to 10, Yale has been hampered in practice by injuries.

The annual battle between Pitts-burgh and West Virginia occurs at Pittsburgh. Pittsburgh shared the mythical Eastern championship with Yale last year.

New York's attention will be centered chiefly on the intracity struggle between Fordham and New York University, two unbeatens eleven's.

Penn State remembers well its 7-0 defeat by Bucknell last year and has no mind to go through the experience again. Colgate has revenge in mind in its fray with Virginia Poly.

Barring upsets, Princeton and Harvard should not be unduly troubled by Virginia and North Carolina. Cornell meets Hampton Sidney and Brown tackles a heavy Dayton team in Providence in the other intercollegiate clashes of the day in the East.

Among other games are: Army-Providence; Columbia-Wesleyan; Davidson-Altoona; Georgetown-Labanon Valley; Lafayette-George Washington; Pennsylvania-Swarthmore; Washington and Jefferson-Duquesne; Syracuse-Johns Hopkins; Lehigh-Gettysburg.

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OVER 100,000 WILL SEE NOTRE-DAME AND NAVY GAME

Largest Football Crowd in History Expected at Soldier Field in Chicago Today.

Chicago, Oct. 13 (AP)—Before 120,000 or more spectators, the largest football throng ever assembled in America, two Trojan eleven's, Notre Dame and the Navy, were ready to match speed and brawn in the arena of massive Soldier Field today.

Other gridiron classics there have been, but from the standpoint of attendance, celebration, color and romance, this duel between two fighting teams that already have been spectators of them all, rivalling in splendor even the field days of ancient Rome.

For Chicago, which also had the important Western games of its program, it was by far the red letter day in football history. More than 200,000 were expected to watch the three games, and the city seethed with excitement. Streets were jammed and thousands of police struggled to keep the tremendous traffic moving.

The glamour of the spectacle at Soldier Field, which attracted scores of celebrities, all but dwarfed the outcome of the contest between Knute Rockne's Ramblers and "Navy Bill" Ingram's Midshipmen. Among the box holders were Vice President Charles G. Dawes, Secretary of the Navy Curtis D. Wilbur, other high naval officials, and many movie stars including Gloria Swanson, Lew Cody, Norma Shearer, and Molly O'Neill. On the sidelines room was made for Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig of the New York Yankees' "Home Run Twins." The Bamblino was a Notre Dame rooter, while Larrupin's Lou was out for the Navy.

VISITORS PROVE NO MATCH FOR HIGH SCHOOL OUTFIT

Displaying speed, craft and drive that surprised even the most optimistic of the supporters, the Bulldogs ran up a 51 to 0 score over the hard fighting football team from Sylvester at the stadium yesterday afternoon.

The star back Dupree and one or two of the varsity had been disqualified on account of scholastic troubles and the team was not the strong one that held Valdosta and Moultrie to a two touchdown margin in the past week. This did not mean to take credit from the Bulldogs' deserved laurels but it is the truth and should be considered when comparisons are made with other teams within the conference by scores.

Atlanta, Oct. 12 (AP)—Dixie joined its greatest threat of modern football history into New England today and anxiously awaited the results from the scattered battlefield.

Georgia had hopes that the Bulldog of Athens would score its second triumph, over Yale's big blue team, although the Southerners were apparently weaker in the line than a year ago but seemed to have the same drive in the backfield.

The Tar Heels of Chapel Hill were far from home, storming Harvard's Holyoke and firmly believing that by next North Carolina may hold a victory over the famed Crimson.

Virginia's Cavaliers, Sloan, Close and All, founded at the Princeton Tiger, and, too, had visions of an after game celebration.

The three of the South's best met the one time powerful entity of the gridiron while Virginia polytechnic institute added to the intercollegiate holiday with an appearance against Colgate at Hamilton, last year.

The South offered several home at traction of outstanding importance, Georgia Tech, undefeated in the Southern Conference last season and getting off to a good start this season, clashed with Tulane University's Greenies at New Orleans in a game expected to produce plenty of thrills. Coach Bierman seems to have the greatest Tulane team since 1915 and will pit blonde Billy Banker against Stumpy Thomason, backfield ace.

Washington and Lee's "Generals," conquerors of North Carolina State a week ago, marched into Kentucky in another important conference contest. Neither the Wildcats or Generals have met a reverse.

Alabama, riding the gridiron great again, turned loose the full force of the Crimson against Mississippi A. and M. at Starkville, Miss., in another big attraction of the day.

University of Mississippi tackled Tennessee at Knoxville in another all conference tilt; Auburn met Florida at Gainesville; and South Carolina featured Zobel against Maryland at Columbia.

Other conference teams had sup posedly less powerful opponents; Louisiana State played Louisiana College at Baton Rouge; Virginia Military Institute met Roanoke and Swann entertained Transylvania.
