Sylvester immediately kicked out of trouble and Harris made a pretty return to the end zone. Four straight first downs by line backs and a pass from Pugh to Davis carried the ball over for the first down. Pugh carried it over and drop kicked goal afterwards. Sylvester received the kick off and failed to make first down on three attempts. Kicking out of bounds on Thomasville's thirty yard line. Pugh ran for twenty yards at left end on the first play. He made ten more on a lateral pass at right end. A pass put the ball nearer to the goal and Vaughn ran fifteen yards for the touchdown. A try for point afterwards failed.

The quarter ended with the score 13 to 0 and the ball in Sylvester's possession on their own forty yard line. They failed to make first down. Vaughn, Pugh, Petty, all contributed to the drive down the field for the second touchdown, a pass was good for twenty yards of the distance. Petty rammed over the touchdown at center and Pugh failed to drop kick goal.

Greer went into the game for Petty and after Thomasville had taken the ball away from Sylvester on a touchdown for forty-five yards for a touchdown on the first play he engaged in. It was a beautiful run.

At this point an almost entirely new team was sent on the field for the Bulldogs and they soon rushed at the ball down the field to within striking distance of the goal—MacDonald ran fifteen yards for the touchdown and Petty failed to kick goal.

Smith went in for Harris, MacDonald for Vaughn and Greer for Petty. This team kept the ball recapping up and down the field until the last minute of the game when MacDonald received a punt on the Sylvester forty yard line and ran through that team for a touchdown. Point after touchdown failed.

The Bulldogs displayed a power in this game that they did not show in the Camilla affair of last week. The reserves were again called upon and showed the crowd that the game that they are almost as good as the varsity. The backfield, composed of Smith at quarter, Greer at half and Pugh at full is as good as any ordinary high schools in this section.

There were too many stars in the game to call by name, but one or two of them have to be picked out. Red Harris at quarter came up to expectations. He ran the team like a veteran and mixed his plays until the Sylvesterans did not know what to expect at any time. He also did some nice running with the ball. Pugh again proved his worth to the team. He played for almost the entire game, and made some beautiful runs. He is a sure passer and can hit the line as few can. Pugh is probably one of the most valuable men on the team this season. Petty as usual, was at top form. He showed his old power and drive and made a couple of nice gains around

Georgia Tech, a powerful member of the G. A. C., completed the intercollegiate invasion, sending the Gentlemen against Texas A. and M., at College Station, Texas.

The South offered several more attractions of outstanding importance.

Georgia Tech, undefeated in the Southern Conference last season and getting off to a good start this season, clashed with Tulane University's team at New Orleans in a game expected to produce plenty of thrills. Coach Blerman seems to have the greatest Tulane team since 1915 and will pit blondie Billy Banker against Stumpy Thomason's backfield ace.

Washington and Lee's Generals, conquerors of North Carolina State a week ago, marched into Raleigh in another important conference contest. Whether the Wildcats or Generals have met a reversal.

Alabama, riding the gridiron crest again, turned loose the full force of the Crimson against Mississippi A. and M. at Starkville, Miss., in another big attraction of the day.

University of Mississippi tackled Tennessee at Knoxville in another all conference tilt; Auburn met Florida at Gainesville; and South Carolina featured Zobel against Maryland at Columbia.

Other conference teams had supposedly less powerful opponents. Louisiana State played Louisiana College at Baton Rouge; Virginia Military Institute met Roanoke and Genoa; and Pennsylvania State and Clemson played yesterday.

Birmingham Southern met Chattanooga University at Birmingham and Oglethorpe clashed with Loyola of New Orleans at Atlanta in the outstanding games of the day within the S. I. A. A.
