## BULLDOGS UNCORK GREAT OFFENSIVE IN SECOND HALF TO CRUSH DAWSON ELEVEN 44 TO 6 BEFORE SMALL CROWD

Doughty Terrell County Squad Puts Up Great Game in the First Half But Weaken Later Under Gruelling Drive Of Locals Who Score Total of Seven Touchdowns

Although rather slow in getting started the Bulldogs uncorked a terrific offensive in the second half of the game yesterday and defeated Dawson's doughty team under and advantage of seven touchdowns, to the tune of 44 to 6. The largest crowd of the season for this city saw the game.

Dawson fought the Bulldogs to a 7 to 6 standstill in the first quarter of the game, but the Bulldogs managed to send over a touchdown in the second quarter to make a score 13 to 6 at the end of the half. It was in the last two quarters that the drive started that netted five touchdowns and a field goal. Dawson seemed to crumple under the charge of the Bulldog backs and linemen and the rout came.

The first quarter of the game was marred by frequent fumbles by both teams. Captain Jones won the toss and elected to receive. After making a first down English fumbled for Dawson and Shargat Chastain recovered on the Dawson 25 yard stripe. Petty fumbled after making a ten yard gain through the Dawson line. Dawson recovered on the 15 yard marker. After making another first down, Jones of Dawson fumbled and Thomasville recovered on the 30 yard line. Pugh got 7 at left guard. Vaughn ran twenty yards out of bounds at left tackle. Petty got five at center and Pugh ran over for two yards and a touchdown.

## CAIRO NOSES OUT CAMILLA BY MARGIN OF ONE TOUCHDOWN

Mitchell County Lads Show Unexpected Strength. — Syrup-Makers Priming For Thomasville Game

Cairo, Ga., Nov. 17.—A crippled Cairo high football clan barely managed to win over an unexpectedly strong Camilla high eleven here Friday afternoon. The visitors held the Cairoites three times in the shadow of the Camilla goal line and threatened on another occasion to score a second time, but Cairo finally saved the day with a 13 to 7 game.

The game was a rather listless affair, being marred by several bad fumbles and poor punting. Camilla completed six passes in ten attempts for good gains, although the Cairoites relied altogether on straight football.

Coach John Herndon has been busy engaged this week in preparing his charges for the Thomasville-Cairo game. In Thomasville, next Friday, and he had hoped that the Camilla outfit would be rather easy, but the Mitchell countians furnished opposition a plenty.

Cairo has lost only one game this season thus far, being defeated only by the Valdosta Wildcats, 12 to 6. A Tiger victory over the Thomasville Bulldogs next Friday would put the Cairoites in the running for second honors in the conference, at least. The odds, of course, favor the Bulldogs, but Cairo at least has a fighting chance to win.

## CONFERENCE GAMES WILL FEATURE GRID TILTS IN THE SOUTH TODAY

Atlanta, Nov. 17. (AP)—All but four of the 22 teams in the Southern conference were pitted against family foes today before some 150,000 football followers. Five of those aggregations—V. Georgia Tech, Florida, Tennessee, P. L., and Louisiana State—were defending unblemished conference records.

First in importance on the basis of an estimated 25,000 attendance was the Georgia Tech-Alabama game at Atlanta, wherein Tech, unbeaten anywhere and victorious in four conference encounters engaged a team that had whipped the Yellow Jackets in four out of their last five games. But none the less, the Yellow Jackets were favorites while the Crimson Tide, trimmed by Tennessee and Wisconsin, was staging a comeback of as yet untried scope.

Florida's scoring machine holding high national ranking and also unbeaten anywhere, tackled at Jacksonville, a rejuvenated Clemson Tiger who had lost only to Mississippi this year. The Gators, like Tech, have scored four conference victories, and based their confidence also on the record of four straight victories against Clemson since their first encounter in 1911. Consequently the Gators were favorites before a crowd of 15,000.

Tennessee's volunteers went to Nashville intent on their purpose to beat Vanderbilt, vanquished by Georgia Tech alone. If the Vols succeed before some 15,000 spectators they will accomplish a feat they have been unable to perform since 1916. The traditional clash ended in a tie last year. Tennessee has the edge today, by virtue of her four conference victories, but it was very slim.

The two other unbeaten elevens, V. P. L., and Louisiana State, were favored over Washington and Lee at Lexington and Georgia at Athens respectively. V. P. L. has won three conference victories and Louisiana State two.

Both Sewanee and Tulane, had revised their style of play for a clash at New Orleans Auburn Tigers and the Mississippi Aegies were similarly rejuvenated in their Birmingham meeting; Maryland, conqueror of Yale last week, and Virginia, who tied Princeton, were at College Park for their fourth game since 1919; meanwhile Kentucky engaged V. M. I. at Lexington.
