WOMAN PHYSICIAN / NEAR DEATH IN AN EFFORT AT SUICIDE

Philadelphia Woman Who Figured in Murder Hoax Recently, is Near Death.

Philadelphia, Nov. 17 (AP)—With two self-inflicted bullet wounds near her heart, Dr. Virginia Alvarez Hussey, who last July created a sensation by confessing that she had slain her husband, Lindley M. Hussey, novelist, and "the other woman," was in a critical condition today at the Misericordia Hospital.

After the police had found Hussey and "the other woman," Mrs. Grace Towler Saucier, wealthy divorcee, alive at an artists' colony near Sergeantville, N. J., Dr. Hussey was pronounced mentally unbalanced and committed to the Norrisham State Hospital. She was released two months ago and friends said she and her husband had become reconciled, although they were not living together.

Dr. Hussey, a graduate of the Women's Medical College of this city, was found unconscious in her room last night by Mrs. M. Chorrlers, who conducts the apartment house. Two bullets had pierced her breast and a 12 calibre pistol was tightly grasped in her hand.
