

ANDREWS PACES TRIUMPH

Thomasville Claims Eighth Victim, 38-6

ALBANY — Albany High distinguished itself last night by becoming the first team in 1973 to actually push across a touchdown against Thomasville High's highly rated defense, but that was their only redeeming factor as the Indians became the eighth Bulldog victim by the score of 38-6.

Thomasville had already scored three touchdowns and a field goal before Albany drove 56 yards in nine plays to get their only touchdown late in the third quarter. Shortly afterwards, Albany threatened and just might have turned the game around but the Bulldogs held at the three-yard line. Thomasville drove for two touchdowns in the final period to give the Bulldogs their eighth win of the season against no defeats.

WILLIAM ANDREWS paced the Bulldog offense with 123 yards in 20 carries and three touchdowns. The Bulldog tailback scored on runs of 39, 28, and one yard. **Al Fann** added 82 yards to his season total in eight carries. **David Mitchell** got 31 yards and Ernest Kirksey got 13.

Kirksey also kicked five of five extra point attempts and a 35-yard field goal — his fourth of the season. Larry McIlhenny continued to score from his defensive position when he recovered a blocked punt in the Indian and scored for the game's first touchdown. Second-team quarterback Jack Cannady continued to show his passing skills hitting on two of two passes for 29 yards, including an eight-yard touchdown pass to Thomas Graham for the game's final touchdown. Junior James Diggs kicked the final extra point for the Bulldogs. Thomasville had dominated play in the first half, allowing Albany only three yards of offense, including minus four rushing and seven passing. The Bulldogs had a 17-0 lead at halftime.

THE BULLDOGS got a break when Al Fann returned the opening kickoff 34 yards to the Albany 34-yard line. Thomasville drove to the 15 but gave up the ball when a Mitchell-James Miles pass fell just short of a first down. Punting from their own end zone on third down, the Indians found their kick blocked by several rushing Bulldogs. McIlhenny recovered the football right in front of the Albany kicker to give Thomasville a 17-0 lead with 7:36 left in the first quarter. Three plays after the kickoff, Albany had to punt but Kirksey fumbled on the first Bulldog play. Thomasville held again

and the Indians again punted. **and Thomasville** fumbled the punt to give the Indians the ball at the Bulldog 19. Three plays later Albany was at the five-yard line and threatening. But on the next play, Marvin Wilson fired through the Indian line, passed the football away from the Indian quarterback and Eugene Clark recovered it 30 yards up the field.

The Bulldogs then picked up two first downs but they had to punt Jim Keyton's punt was down in the seven-yard line and two plays later Danny Scott recovered an Albany fumble at the four to set up the second Bulldog touchdown. Andrew scored from the one to make it 14-0 with nine minutes left in the half. Late in the second quarter, Thomasville drove from their own 38 to the Indian 18 where Kirksey kicked his 35-yard field goal with 41 seconds left. Albany took the second half kickoff and drove to the Bulldog 36, but a Jimmy Bowdry interception ended their threat at the 14.

TAKING ADVANTAGE of this break, Thomasville drove 86 yards in only five plays, with Andrew sprinting 39 yards for his second touchdown. Kirksey's kick made it 24-0. Albany took the next kickoff and drove 66 yards against the no. 1 defense in the state. James Harper scored on a four-yard run through the very middle of the Bulldog defense. The extra point attempt failed. After the team swapped punts, the Indian again drove into scoring range, with three first downs. They apparently scored on a three-yard run but Albany was called for holding and was penalized back to the 18 (in fourth down, Thomasville took over at the three). With Jack Cannady at quarterback, the Bulldogs drove 37 yards in eight plays. A Cannady-to-Graham pass got the Bulldogs 21 yards to the Albany 33 the next play. William Andrews latched two tackles at the line and scored 30 yards to score to make it 34-0. After the kickoff Marvin Wilson again took the football from an Albany quarterback to

 There's some good news today for Central players, coaches and fans... and some bad news. First the good news — Central, behind big left quarterback Kirby Reichert, rolled to a convincing 24-0 triumph over Early County last night at Thomas County Stadium.

EARLY MANAGED—just four first downs in the game and 121 yards in total offense. The Bobcats tossed 10 passes in the second half, hit on four for 73 yards. The Jackets finished the game with 311 yards in offense — excluding the first game, it was the best showing of the season for the Central offensive unit. Central took the opening kickoff and moved quickly to the Bobcats 30-yard line, but a fumble halted the early drive. That mistake was the last in the half for CHS.

action. With 38 seconds remaining in the opening quarter, CHS led 14-0. The second quarter saw the Jackets drive in the Early 10. Both times Central was forced to punt. CHS ran 17 plays to only seven for the Bobcats in that quarter. Central kicked off in the second half and the defense was just as tough, yielding only seven yards and forcing a punt. It was Quigg and Walden moving the Jackets quickly down the field in the Early nine-yard line where a third down play failed. Reichert sharpened up the toe and easily booted a 26-yard field goal. **THE FINAL TD** drive began late in the third quarter. It was reserve fullback Robert Watts providing the rushing and a Reichert to Chris Tucker pass for 26 yards to move to the 23. Walden raced 21 yards in two plays and Quigg finished the effort by the Jackets with a blast through the middle for the score. Reichert added the PAT. Early then mounted its last scoring threat in the third quarter with two passing covering 50 yards to move to the Central 24. The defense for the Jackets stiffened up and halted the attempt.

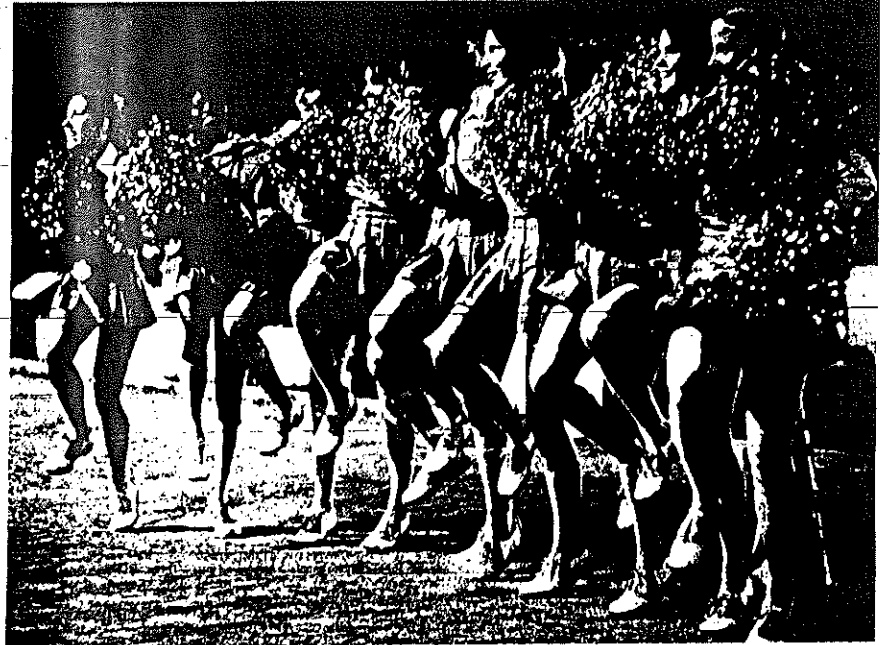

No. 7 Missouri is at Colorado for a Big Eight contest; Louisiana State, No. 9, visits South Carolina at night and No. 10 Nebraska is at Oklahoma State in another Big Eight pairing. The decisive national championship at Auburn, No. 12 Arizona State and Oregon State in Portland for a night game, California at No. 13 UCLA, Texas Christian at No. 14 Tennessee. Georgia Tech at No. 15 Tulane, Toledo at No. 16 Miami of Ohio, No. 17 Kansas at Iowa State, Southern Methodist at No. 18 Texas Tech, Rice at No. 19 Texas and No. 20 (Eastern) Northeast Louisiana under the lights.

Houston has rolled to six straight victories behind versatile quarterback D. C. Nobles who triggers the Cougar Year-7 attack. Nobles is averaging 175 yards per game total offense. The War Eagles have a 4-2 season record including only one loss to Tennessee and LSU. Coach Steve Sloan's Vanderbilt Commodores will be seeking their second straight upset victory at Ole Miss, after having pinned an 16-14 shaver on Georgia last week. The Commodores haven't won two straight SEC games since 1969 and haven't defeated Ole Miss in 22 years. Coach Vince Dooley has revamped his offensive line for this week's engagement with improving Kentucky at Athens. The Wildcats feature the SEC's leading runner in Alfred "Sonny" Collins. Alabama is a prohibitive favorite to make VPI its seventh straight victim, but Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant warned early in the week: "We can't look back at Tennessee. We've got to forget that game and prepare for this one like it was the Rose Bowl." The SEC is also favored in the

three remaining nonconference battles — LSU, winner of six straight, over South Carolina State over Southern and Tennessee over TCU. (Georgia Tech is in the midst of one of its poorest starts ever, having lost four of six games. "This is an important game for us," says Tech coach Bill Foltz. "We still have five games to play and we aren't going to write this season off now.")

The bad news — there's no way for the Yellow Jackets to reach the Region IAA playoffs at the end of the season. Americus defeated World County, 27-1, last night to clinch the Region IAA-West title. It was a slim crowd on hand to see Central win its sixth game of the season against one loss and a tie.

THE JACKETS were competing against the fair at the gate and the Yellow Jackets were the fan who gave up a night of high school football — especially the Central game. Reichert scored 119. First Central touchdown, then the second and booted a field goal all in the first three quarters to get the Jackets rolling with a 17-0 lead before the reserves began to take over the reigns. The first half was a combination of excellent running by tailback Russ Walden and fullback Kenneth Quigg, who blasted through the Early defense for sizable gains in moving the Jackets into scoring position. Central had command of the game from the beginning and the first half statistics were so one-sided as the game to that point. The Jackets amassed 37 yards in total offense, all but 39 yards on the ground while Early was stopped with 37 and no first downs.

Walden hit quickly for three yards and that was enough of the running attack. Reichert took the snap, hit light end Dudley Moore over the middle and the punt went 39 yards for the touchdown. Houston Picked To Dent Auburn Homecoming

Undefeated Houston, the nation's No. 12 power, is favored to dent Coach Hally "Shug" Jordan's impressive homecoming record Saturday when the Cougars tangle with Auburn in the weekend's most attractive game in the South. Auburn has won 20 of its last 22 homecoming games with Jordan at the helm. Only two Southeastern Conference games are on the agenda with upstart Vanderbilt visiting Mississippi and Kentucky going to Georgia.

Other nonconference action has second-ranked Alabama entertaining Virginia Tech at Tuscaloosa, ninth-ranked Louisiana State at South Carolina, Texas Christian at No. 14 Tennessee and Southern Mississippi at Mississippi State. Florida is idle. The top game involving area independents has straggling Georgia Tech visiting unbeaten Tulane, ranked 15th nationally. Elsewhere, Miami of Florida is at Syracuse, Northern Michigan at Tampa and Michigan State at San Diego State. Memphis State has an open date.

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Southern Cal, Irish In Elimination Match

 Southern California and Notre Dame, two of the nation's 15 unbeaten college football teams and both members of The Associated Press Top Ten, square off Saturday in a revenge match that likely will eliminate at least one of them from national championship contention. John McKay of Southern Cal calls it "the biggest inter-collegiate game of the year." Notre Dame's Ara Parseghian, who hasn't beaten the Trojans or won a national title since 1966, says it will be "a helluva game." And the Notre Dame campus in northern Indiana, where the game will be played hasn't been this stirred up since the Michigan State member of 1965.

A sellout crowd of \$9,075 — the going rate for tickets is around \$50 — and a regional television audience — the ABC-TV region includes about 85 per cent of the country — will see sixth-ranked Southern California attempt to keep its hopes alive for a second consecutive national championship against eight-rated Notre Dame. Besides Notre Dame, the only other Top Ten teams at home Saturday are No. 1 Ohio State, which entertains Big Ten rival Northwestern; runnerup Alabama, which hosts Virginia Tech, and fifth-ranked Penn State, which meets West Virginia. Oklahoma, ranked third, visits Kansas State for a Big Eight tussle. No. 4 Michigan is at Buc
