



Thomasville's Andrews Races Around End For Big Gain

Thomasville Loss Has 1AAA Picture Cloudy

Thomasville lost to Dougherty last night, but Moultrie fell to Crisp County and Bainbridge lost to Monroe and that puts Thomasville leading Region 1AAA with a 5-1 record. Moultrie's record is now 5-2 and Dougherty is 6-2. Bainbridge owns a 3-3 record. Although Thomasville is no longer undefeated and will no doubt fall from their No. 1 spot in statewide prep polls, the Bulldogs stand an excellent chance to repeat as Region Champions and enter the state playoffs.

2nd Quarter Blitz Whips Bearcats, 30-25

RAINBRIDGE. The Monroe of Albany Toronado won an offensive duel here Saturday night with a 22-point second quarter blitz, enough to edge Bainbridge 30-25, in 1-AAA Region play. Monroe scored twice in the second quarter on runs by Henry Johnson and Alphonso Gadson after taking Bainbridge down at the Monroe 31-yard line.

The region's leading punter, Mike Conger, booted a kick that stopped at the Toronados' three-yard line, but Monroe bounced back on a 75-yard drive. A 51-yard pass play from Van Holsey to James Plou capped the effort. Jesse King narrowed the lead with a 49-yard touchdown run to pull the Bearcats to within a 22-7 deficit at halftime. Monroe scored again with only 13 seconds left in the second quarter. Bainbridge closed the gap with three touchdowns in five offensive drives. Anthony Flanders carried the first drive over on 47 yards out, but failed to carry the extra point over on a run. Flanders gained 147 yards rushing in 21 carries and Gadson paced Monroe with 140 yards rushing on 16 carries.

Tulane Risks Unbeaten Mark

ATLANTA (AP) — Eighteenth-ranked Tulane, the South's only unbeaten independent football team, tangles with Georgia Tech Saturday in a regionally televised (ABC) game. Tulane, winner of 37 of its last 21 games and five straight this season, is a three-point favorite to trim the Jackets in Grant Field for the first time in 41 years. Tech has used its home field supremacy to build a 29-10 lead in this series between two former members of the Southern Conference. A crowd of 40,000 is expected for the 2:30 p.m. EDT kickoff, with the telecast being beamed to four states—Alabama, Georgia, Louisiana and Mississippi. Tulane's last conquest of the Yellow Jackets here came in 1953 when Bucky Bryan returned a kickoff for a touchdown.

Saturday night in Albany — Moultrie and Lowndes. To win the region, Thomasville must win all of its remaining games, but even a loss to Moultrie would not rule out the Bulldogs chances, since that occurrence could possibly throw the region into a tie. In the event of a tie, Thomasville and Moultrie would have a playoff game during the week before the regular playoffs begin. Regardless of the way the standings end up this year, this will mark the first time in many seasons that the Region 1AAA Champion will go into the playoffs without an undefeated record. Only three of the eight AAA regions in the state can produce undefeated teams going into the playoffs this year. Groves of Savannah could win their 3AAA Region with an undefeated mark. Either Warner Robins or Columbus should come out of Region 2AAA with an unbeaten record. But the 4AAA winner will not be undefeated. Richmond Academy, leading that region, has been defeated once this season.

Only one team in North Georgia is undefeated in AAA play. Wheeler dumped North Cobb, 27-0, last night to wrap up their sub-region title and to become the only team in the four North Georgia regions to own a 8-0 unbeaten record. Wheeler faces two more sub-region foes this season — Marietta and Sprayberry and those two teams have a combined record of 3-10-2. There is no chance that Wheeler will face another undefeated team this year, until the final game of the playoffs. Griffin will win 6AAA with a once-beaten record, Lakeside or Henderson will take 8AAA with a blemished record and Southbeat DeKalb will probably take 7AAA with a loss on their record. If Thomasville should be the South Georgia team that makes it to the finals, then Wheeler will not face an undefeated team the rest of the way. However, if Columbus, Groves or Warner Robins is the South Georgia Champ, Wheeler would then face the possibility of running into an unbeaten team.

Although Wheeler is the only unbeaten team in North Georgia, they will face two teams in their first two playoff games that could easily upset the Wildcats. Griffin and Henderson could both trip up the Wildcats.

Meanwhile, Dougherty ran up 112 yards rushing and 31 yards through the air in the first half while scoring three touchdowns on the surprised Bulldogs. The Trojans never turned the ball over to the Bulldogs all night. Although Dougherty had been averaging four or five fumbles per game, last night the Trojans never fumbled. The second-half statistics show that Thomasville dominated the action. The Bulldogs gained 170 yards on the ground in the second half and added six more in the air. Thomasville picked up 12 first downs in the second half, and Dougherty got only two. But those two came at the end of the game when the Trojans needed to run out the clock. Dougherty got 98 yards rushing in the second half and 67 of those yards came on the longest run of the game — a 67-yard touchdown scamper by Mack Green.

THOSE WHO were looking at the game as a battle between the top two running backs in the region — Dougherty's Mack Green and Thomasville's William Andrews — had to call it a draw. Green picked up 129 yards in 21 carries while Andrews gained 128 yards in 21 carries. Andrews scored twice, but Green scored three times. Green has a slight lead on Andrews in the region rushing race, but Green has played one more game than has Andrews. Andrews now has 970 official yards and 19 touchdowns in seven games. "Statbook" was one observers' estimation of the Thomasville performance last night, and it showed up on the first play from scrimmage when Andrews fumbled the football after a 61-yard drive. Dougherty took over the ball at the 49-yard line and drove for a touchdown in 11 plays. Time and time again, in crucial situations, the Trojans went to Green and Green got the necessary yardage. It was Green who scored from three yards out with 6:09 left in the first quarter to make Dougherty the first team in two years to hold a lead over the Bulldogs. THOMASVILLE'S bad luck continued on the next kickoff when Al Fann fumbled after a 17-yard return.

Dougherty got the ball at the Bulldogs 30 this time but failed to move. Kerbs took the Trojan punt, scored on the drive, could be tackled and raced 45 yards to score.
