COTTON RATES FOR NEW ORLEANS DISTRICT FIXED
(By Associated Press.)
Washington, Oct. 27.—The complaint recently filed by the New Orleans Cotton Exchange, that rates on cotton from points on the Southern Railway, within a radius of three hundred miles of New Orleans, were unreasonable, was upheld in a decision announced here to-day by the Interstate Commerce Commission.
A maximum rate of fifty cents per hundred pounds was prescribed for that territory.

THOMASVILLE HIGH BEAT TALLAHASSEE

At End of Play Score Was 12 to 7, But Figures Don't Tell the Story of Very Interesting Contest Played on Local Lot Friday Afternoon.

Thomasville High defeated Tallahassee high yesterday afternoon in one of the closest football games of the present season. The score was twelve to seven.

Thomasville kicked off and after a few minutes of play recovered the ball on a fumble. A forward pass failed and Tallahassee recovered the ball. After several gains the Floridians lost the ball on a fumble. Within thirty yards of goal, Ferguson passed the ball to McDougald, a distance of twenty-five yards. In four downs Thomasville failed to get the ball across the line. Ferguson went out of the game and Rehberg went in.

In the second quarter Thomasville made three downs on steady straight football. They then made twenty-five yards on a forward pass and went around end for twenty more. Within one yard of goal the visitors lost the ball on a fumble. Jack Cox recovering the ball. Thomasville went nine yards and lost the ball on downs and then Tallahassee was stopped for downs—the ball being only three inches of the goal line.

In the fourth quarter Thomasville received and advanced the ball seven yards. Thomasville lost fifteen yards on an attempted forward pass and kicked sixty yards. Thomasville then took the ball on downs, took fifteen yards on a forward pass and eighteen on another. When within six yards of goal another forward pass was made, Ferguson to Morgan, for a touchdown.

No goal was kicked. Thomasville kicked and Tallahassee advanced the ball to the middle of the field in rapid plays.

In the fourth quarter Morgan took a forward pass of forty yards for a touchdown and no goal was kicked again. Tallahassee then started a rapid advance and made a forward pass of twenty-five yards, forty on another and then within seven yards of goal it kicked over for a touchdown, kicking the goal. The teams then maneuvered in the middle of the field during the four minutes of play remaining, neither side gaining any distinct advance until the last minute of play when Thomasville got the ball on a fumble and Tallahassee intercepted a forward pass for fifteen yards. The game ended, score, Thomasville, 12, Tallahassee 7.

The work of Jack Cox at end was especially effective and the forward pass work of Ferguson and Morgan featured. The visitors seemed more able to gain a round end and through the line than the locals, but they failed at critical times with the ball within two yards of goal.

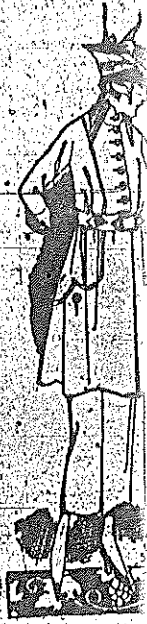

New York, Oct. 27.—There were many substantial advances in the Stock Market list today, but shipments led the entire list, Marine preferred gaining more than six points. Prominent rails rose 1 to 2 points, Steels, Coppers and related equipments rose 1 to 3 points and oils and sugars about as much also.
A few of the weak issues included Brooklyn Transit and Pittsburgh Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis, which lost 7 1/2 points on a single sale. The market closed irregular.

COTTON MARKET.

New York, Oct. 27.—Cotton opened today on a renewal of Southern selling and local pressure, closing steady at a net decline of 24 to 42 points. The market opened easy 13 to 33 points down. People with Liverpool and trade connections buying at the decline caused rallies but the market turned easier late in the session under more southern selling.
