

SYLVESTER SWAMPED BY BULLDOGS

A LITTLE BULL SESSION OVER THE BULLDOGS

With reserves playing most of the game, the Bulldogs ran through a weak Sylvester High eleven at the stadium yesterday afternoon for a 46 to 0 victory. The Thomasville team won under wraps and was not extended by the gamely fighting but badly outclassed visiting team, save in the second period when the Bulldog second eleven was battled on more than seven terms. The Bulldogs started the game by scoring two touchdowns on the first two plays they ran from scrimmage and it appeared for the moment that the game was going to be a complete rout. Two more touchdowns in the first period and the second period was scoreless with the Sylvester goal being crossed once more in the third and twice in the fourth quarter.

More than three full teams were used in the game by the Bulldogs, every man on the squad seeing service. The scrubs performed their duties very creditably. They stopped a threatening Sylvester drive in the second period, drove to two touchdowns of their own in the final period and chalked up six first downs against the visitors. The Bulldog varsity accounted for five touchdowns during their stay in the game. Sylvester made a total of five first downs, all of them against the second and third string Bullpups.

The Thomasville first team started the game. The varsity line-up was intact save for one position. "Lindberg" Heald was at right tackle in the place of Captain Tom Jones who did not play in the game. Captain Overton of Sylvester won the loss and elected to receive.

Hendricks kicked off to Overton who returned 35 yards from his 5 to his 30 yard line. Meadows was hit by Pugh for an 8 yard loss at left and White could only get 1 yard at right guard. While then dropped back to punt and Richards, Bulldog center, broke through to kick. Heald recovered for Thomasville on Sylvester's 7 yard line and on one play Hendricks crashed over for a touchdown, going over left guard. Hendricks missed his try for the extra point and the score stood at 6 to 0.

Sylvester chose to kick this time and Hamilton booted the ball to Pugh who returned it from his 30 yard line to midfield. Little "Doc" Daughtry, the speedster of the Bulldog backfield, then circled right end, eluded the Sylvester secondary nicely and traveled 90 yards on his winged feet to cross the goal line for another touchdown. Hendricks again missed goal and the count was 12 to 0.

Sylvester again kicked off. Thompson took the ball on his own 5 yard line and raced back with it to the 25 yard stripe. Hendricks, Milton and Daughtry went off the tackles and ends for the two first downs to Sylvester's 33 yard line from where Hendricks tossed a pass to Pugh who gathered it in and slipped over the line for another score. The same pass combination, Hendricks to Pugh, scored the extra point, bringing the score to 18 to 0.

Only three more plays were required to get another touchdown as Hendricks, shortly after the Bulldogs had received the kickoff, slipped off left tackle from the Sylvester 47 yard line, sidestepped the Sylvester end who went on unimpeded across the line. Hendricks' kick again missed its mark and the score was 25 to 0.

At this point the entire second team was substituted for the Tville varsity eleven. Holton and Dekle took the end position, Lamb and H. Heald returned in at the tackles, Callaway and Crawford at guards, Pettigrew at center and Zalumas, Mallard, Vaughan and Vann in the backfield.

TRADITIONAL GAMES IN EAST BE PLAYED

S. I. A. A. GAMES TO ENTERTAIN DIXIE

Atlanta, Nov. 22 (AP)—A cluster of Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association games and a scattering of conference conflicts gave the Dixie football fan plenty of variety today but the championship favor was absent.

Yanoverhill was a top-heavy choice to reach over Auburn at Nashville, Tenn., in a renewal of a gridiron rivalry that had its inception in 1893. North Carolina State wound up its year's work against South Carolina at Columbia. S. C. Duke charged against Wake Forest at Wake Forest, N. C., and Maryland engaged the Navy. Sewanee ended its 1930 campaign by meeting Southwestern in Memphis. Oglethorpe met Mercer at Macon, Ga.

In the S. I. A. A. title, Centenary, one of the few unbeaten teams in the circle, took on Louisiana Tech, Eastern and western Kentucky came to grips at Richmond, Ky., while Wolford and Erskine battled at Spartanburg, S. C., Southern and Stetson fought at Deland, Fla., and Birmingham Southern and Howard settled city honors at Birmingham, Ala.

DISTANCE RUNNERS AT CHAPEL HILL

Chapel Hill, N. C., Nov. 22 (AP)—The cream of Dixie's distance runners was at the University of North Carolina today for the seventh annual running for the Southern Conference Cross Country Championship.

Seventy athletes, representing ten colleges and universities, are entered. The event starts at 2:30 p. m. over a five mile route.

The Tar Heels have won the championship for four consecutive years. Teams from the following schools hope to take the title this year, Virginia Military Institute, Virginia Polytechnic, Georgia Tech, Virginia, Duke, Georgia, Florida, Washington and Lee and Tennessee.

MOULTRIE PATRIOTS DEFEAT SPARKS-ADDEL HIGH 23 TO 0 Moultrie, Ga., Nov. 22.—The Moultrie High Packers experienced little trouble in defeating Sparks-Adel High by a 23 to 0 score on the local field Friday afternoon.

The Packers scored two touchdowns in the first quarter, two in the second, and one in each of the last two periods. Two of the tries for this point after touchdown, were successful. Moultrie used many substitutes in the game, the most spectacular runs of the game were two of about 50 yards each made by Earl Blanton of outstanding feature of the Packers' play was their team work. Nothing but straight football was used. In the last period the Sparks-Adel team held Moultrie for downs once within the 10-yard line.

FITZGERALD HIGH WON FROM DOUGLAS HIGH 20-12 Fitzgerald, Ga., Nov. 22.—Fitz-Hi won the ninth successive victory to date by defeating Douglas High school 20 to 12. This is the sixth conference victory and is the second time that the Fitzgerald High school team has been scored on.

By virtue of the victory today Fitz-Hi still claims the Southwest Georgia conference leadership. The first score of the game was made after about ten minutes play when Captain Lee intercepted a pass and returned it 45 yards for a score. Brown bucked over the extra point. A few plays later McQuig, on a spin play, broke loose and ran 45 yards before he was downed in open field by Goodwin star Douglas back.

In the second quarter Fitz-Hi recovered a fumble on Douglas 20-yard line and on the next play McQuig broke through their tight tackle for a score. A pass, McQuig to Steed was good for the extra point.

In the second half Douglas came back with a rush and Goodwin, the flashy halfback of Douglas, cut back through tackle and raced 50 yards for a score. This was quickly followed by a second score when Garbutt took the ball on reverse and ran 20 yards for the score, this ended the scoring for the day.

RAINBRIDGE DEFEATED ALBANY INDIANS 12-7

Albany, Ga., Nov. 22.—Albany High Indians closed their home schedule this afternoon with a 12-7 defeat at the hands of the Rainbridge Bearcats.

The visitors scored a touchdown in the first quarter when E. Nesbitt, plunged over tackle, following a Rainbridge drive that began when a punt was blocked on Albany's 50-yard line and recovered by Rainbridge, Albany scored on a forward pass, Willis to Allan, in the second quarter and registered the extra point to lead at the half, 6 to 0.

The Bearcats drove over the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter as the culmination of an 85-yard march that began in the third quarter. Nussbaum carried the ball over on the fourth down after the Indians had held for three downs on their five-yard mark.

Nussbaum was the spark plug of the long drive that whipped the Indians. The visitors outgained the Braves by a large margin, due to greatly superior line play.

RESERVES USED BY BULLDOGS DURING THREE QUARTERS

Small Crowd Saw Bulldog Backs Run Wild Against Worth Countians

After receiving the kick-off, the Bullpups were unable to gain and were forced to kick out Meadows and White by Sylvester then advanced the ball for Sylvester's initial first down to Thomasville's 45 yard line as the period ended.

Punts were exchanged at the start of the second period, the Bulldogs making two first downs in the interim, and then the Sylvester eleven made its only threat, driving through the second string Thomasville line for three first downs to the Red and Black's 5 yard mark. The reserves rallied, however, and took the ball on downs just before the half ended.

Coch Harper sent his first team back into the game at the half. They took the kick and promptly marched down the field for three first downs and another score. Hendricks carried the ball across from the 25 yard line, dragging a Sylvester tackler across with him. Hendricks passed to Mitchell for the extra point to bring the score to 22 to 0. The Bulldog backs were seized by a fumbling habit caused partly by bad passing from center during the remainder of the third quarter and although they made four more first downs, were unable to push across the line again.

With the ball deep in Sylvester territory at the beginning of the final period, the second team Bulldog backfield took the field and were headed for another touchdown when Mallard fumbled and Wolfe recovered for Sylvester on the 5 yard line. Sylvester kicked off but the Bullpups fugged the ball down the field and soon had their touchdown, Zalumas going over for the counter. Mallard bucked the extra point and the count was 29 to 0.

Substitutes again swarmed onto the field, this time by ones and twos and three until every man on the squad saw action. These reserves went to work just as though they were first stringers and soon had another score, the last of the game. Two long gains at the ends by Mallard put the ball in scoring position late in the period and Vann carried it across, Mallard again bucked for the extra point and the score was brought to the 46 to 0 count at which it stood at the end of the game which was shortly after. With Bellamy's interception of a Sylvester pass plunging the ball again in scoring position for the Bullpups, they were again trying for a touchdown at the final whistle.

It would be impossible to pick any one or two outstanding performers from the thirty odd Bulldogs who played in the game. The Tville first eleven although playing loosely and not nearly up to form, was entirely too much for the Sylvester gridiron to cope with. The Bulldog second team proved superior to the Sylvester squad also and the third team was able to put up quite a scrap against the visitors. Leading the fight of the second string Bulldogs were Tim Callaway at guard and Marlon Vaughan at halfback. The defensive performance of these two boys was especially noticeable. The whole second line was functioning nicely and all during the last half charging pony backs, Mallard, Vaughan, Vann and Zalumas to make long gains.

Hamilton and White, two hefty backs, turned in a good days work for the Sylvester eleven. Wolfe at end and Capt. Overton at quarter were defensive mainstays of the Sylvester squad, both making many tackles that prevented the score from being larger.

The Bulldogs were rather successful with their aerial attack, coming off several long gains, one of them going for a touchdown and two more accounting for extra points after touchdowns.

The old statement that anything can happen in a football game was simply born out yesterday when Tifton ousted the Valdosta Wildcats to the tune of 23 to 6. The Bulldogs beat Tifton 23 to 6 and tied Valdosta later in the season, which shows the comparative strength of the two teams. Fitzgerald defeated Douglas, 20 to 12, and the Purple Hurricane's supporters are clamoring for an official conference title. The Hurricane has not lost a game and is in about the same spot as Tulane in the Southern Conference. The schedule does not warrant a championship but one may result, nevertheless, if such things as this continue to happen the Bulldogs would do well to discontinue playing Valdosta, Moultrie, Albany, Tifton and the other strong teams in the conference and only take on the weaker ones. By doing so they could have a conference this every year.

It is a good thing that the Bulldogs were not playing a strong team yesterday for their work was certainly rewarded for the most part. After racking up three touchdowns in
