RESERVES USED BY BULLDOGS DURING THREE QUARTERS

Small Crowd Saw Bulldog Backs Run Wild Against Worth Countians.

After receiving the "kick-out," the Bulldogs were unable to gain and were forced to kick out Meadows and White for Sylvester's initial first down to Thomasville's 45 yard line as the period ended.

Coach Harper sent his first team back into the game at the half.

They took the kick and promptly marched down the field for three first downs and another score. Hendricks carried the ball across from the 10 yard line, dragging a Sylvester tackler across with him. Hendricks passed to Mitchell for the extra point to bring the score to 32 to 0.

Substitutes again swarmed onto the field, this time by ones and twos and three until every man on the squad saw action.

It would be impossible to pick any one or two outstanding performers from the thirty odd Bulldogs who played in the game. The Tifton first eleven although playing loosely and not nearly up to form, was entirely too much for the Sylvester gridder to cope with.

The Bearcats drove over the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter as the culmination of an 88-yard march that began in the third quarter. Nusbaum carried the ball over on the fourth down and the Indians had held for three downs on their five-yard mark.

Hamilton and White, two hairy backs, turned in a good day's work for the Sylvester eleven. Wolfe at end and Capt. Overton at quarter were defensive mainstay of the Sylvester squad, both making many tackles that prevented the score from being larger.

The Bulldogs were rather successful with their aerial attack, completing several long gains, one of them going for a touchdown and two more accounting for extra points after touchdowns.

Georgia will need all the power available in the line when the Tide's mountain of flesh stars charging.

EIGHT CLUBS WILL ENTER SALLY LEAGUE FOR NEXT SEASON

Charlotte, N.C., Nov. 23 (AP)—An increase in membership of the South Atlantic baseball league from six to eight clubs is in prospect for 1931 provided, the inclusion of two more can be achieved without adding excessive mileage to the circuit.

The board of directors yesterday looked favorably upon membership applications from Spartanburg, Florence, and Charleston, S. C., and Wilmington, N. C., but a franchise bid from Jacksonville, Fla., was said to be out of the question because of the city's location with regard to the other clubs.

Night baseball was endorsed with the stipulation that no club would be compelled to install lighting equipment. Increased attendance figures were reported for Augusta and Asheville last season after night baseball was inaugurated.

It was voted that each team pay its traveling expenses and the home club receive the entire gate receipts. The rookie rule was amended with the class C section eliminated. Each team in 1931 will carry two players with no previous professional experience.
