It is a good thing that the dogs were not playing a strong yesterday for their work was cut up by the most part making up three touchdowns.

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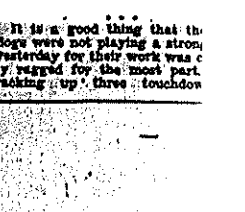
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
