**POLISH REPRESENTATIVE**

TO CONFER WITH STALIN

ON MOBILIZATION PLAN

Truman, Iran, Nov. 28.—Premier Mikail Khrushchev, leader of the Free Polish government, announced that President Roosevelt had promised lend-lease help for a Polish army mobilized in Russia, left by Soviet planes, on route to Moscow to complete arrangements with Premier Stalin.

Polish staff officers and Lieutenant General Leonid Shatov, commander-in-chief of the U.S. Army forces stationed in Siberia, another heavily armored Russian plane, Griffis, who bound for Ruby Bay.

Skoroski foreign correspondent, said that 50,000 British troops and firearms had been distributed much increasing assistance.

Dispatcher from Berlin said Premier Bongram had urged the people to remain calm, declaring the Japanese envoy had told him that Japanese forces in Indo-China were to be withdrawn against Thailand. Meanwhile, air chief marshal Sir Robert Brooke-Popham, commanding chief of British Far East forces, greeted several thousand new troops to his steadily growing command.

The communiqué said the new arrivals from the United Kingdom were "the usual weekly reinforcements" which he now expects
