Bulldogs Wipe Out Tompkins, 41-7

SAVANNAH — A new excitement in the world of entertainment came to Savannah Friday night.

It was called Triple-A football. The Thomasville Bulldogs introduced Chatham County fans to a new world of sports, as they ripped Tompkins High, 41-7, and left the Wolverines, literally, in a fog.

Thomasville's brand of football, which obviously hasn't been seen in these parts for many moons, (or fog?) drew 13,300 football fans to Memorial Stadium. Savannah observers said the Thomasville side of the field held more spectators for the big game than the entire stadium had drawn all season long. The last time a crowd this size had come to the stadium was back in 1956 when Jenkins High of Savannah played a team known as your Valdosta Wildcats.

Since eight of the Savannah area teams still believe that the latest thing in football is the T-formation, Thomasville's performance was indeed a sight to behold.

THE BULLDOGS completely dominated the game offensively and defensively and moved to the State Triple-A Semifinals. They will play the Central of Macon Big Orange Chargers next week, in hopes of earning a berth in the state finals.

Thomasville's balanced offensive attack was never more in evidence than last night, as their number one running back was sidelined in the second quarter on an injured knee.

William Andrews, who was hurt on a 17-yard run which set up a Bulldog touchdown in the second quarter, went to the bench for the rest of the game.

The Bulldog coaches are awaiting a more thorough examination of Andrews' knee before determining if he will play next week.

With Andrews out of the game, quarterback David Mitchell ran for three touchdowns and passed for another to give the Bulldogs a 27-0 halftime lead and ended all hopes for the Wolverines.

MITCHELL SCORED on runs of 51, 39 and one-yard and hit three of three passes for 53 yards, including a 30-yard touchdown pass to Cleo Anderson, all in the first half.

A thick fog covered Memorial Stadium as the bulldogs took the opening kickoff and drove 40 yards in five plays. Mitchell asked to Andrews and rolled 51 yards to give the Bulldogs their first score with less than two minutes gone in the game.

Thomasville did not score again in the first quarter but held the Wolverines to only 10 yards.

Thomasville took a Tompkins punt on the first play of the second quarter and drove 82 yards in 12 plays with key passes from Mitchell to Ernest Kirksey and James Hiles sparking the drive.

ANDREWS RAN from the Tompkins 20 to the three-yard line to set up the Bulldogs on the play on which he was injured. Three plays later Mitchell crashed over number one to make the score 13-0.

After another punt, Thomasville took over at their own 41 and scored three plays later. Mitchell breezed in from 39 yards out to make it 20-0 with 3:13 left in the half.

After another poor Tompkins punt, the Bulldogs got the ball at their own 49 and again took three plays to score. Cleo Anderson made a spectacular catch of a 30-yard Mitchell pass to give Thomasville a 27-0 halftime lead.

The Wolverines got only eight yards in the second quarter.

In the third quarter, Thomasville drove 43 yards with quarterback Jack Cannady in the game to make it 34-0. Cannady hit Thomas Graham on a 15-yard down-the-middle pass for the fifth Bulldog touchdown.

The remainder of the game featured Tompkins' wild passing attack in an effort to get on the scoreboard. As a result, the Bulldogs intercepted three passes in the fourth quarter, two by Jimmy Mitchell and one by Mike Rainey.

THE FOURTH QUARTER was also marred by several personal fouls and unsportsmanlike conduct penalties against the Wolverines. On Rainey's interception for example, the Wolverines received a 15-yard penalty for piling on and Coach Jim Hughes put enough of his first team's offensive back into the game to score a touchdown three plays later.

Jack Cannady rolled in from the ten and John David Peoples booted the extra point to make it 41-0.

Now comes Tompkins' touchdown drive. The Wolverines took over at their own 24 and drove to the

Bulldogs 35 with three first downs as Coach Jerry Raines gave many of the younger defensive players playoff experience.

AS THE WOLVERINES REACHED the 35, however, Thomasville's first team's defense went back into the game.

The Wolverines drove to the Bulldog 21 but then pushed back to the 41. But with time running out in the game Tompkins quarterback Glenn Shealey completed two passes to put the Wolverines on the Bulldog 11 with five seconds left in the game.

On the last play of the game, Larry McPherson chased Shealey out of the pocket and towards the sideline.

But just as he was about to be hit Shealey launched a pass goalward and Warren Haggarty caught the football in the endzone about two inches in bounds to give Tompkins its only moment of glory.

Nicklaus, Miller Put U. S. In Lead In World Cup Golf

MARBELLA, Spain (AP) — A course record of 68 by Gary Miller and a four-under-par 69 by Jack Nicklaus rocketed the United States into a five-hole lead at the halfway point of the World Cup Golf Tournament Friday.
Miller said it was one of those days when everything went right after he reeled off five birdies and an eagle over the 1,800-yard, par-72 seaside Nueva Andalucia course.
After 36 holes of the tournament matching two-man teams from 49 nations, the United States led with a 7-0 total. Argentina, the first round leader, slipped to second at 2-0 on rounds of 75 by 50-year-old Roberto de Vicenzo and 72 by 51-year-old Fido De Luca.
Lu Liang-Huan, the smiling little golfer from Taiwan known as Mr. Lu, curled in a 20-foot putt at the 18th green for a 69 that preserved his lead in the individual competition with 8 rounds left.
Mr. Lu's Thursday tied the course record set by Ramon Sola of Spain, but that disappeared under Miller's assault.
Nicklaus was second in the individual standings at 13, Miller third at 18, De Vicenzo and Valentin Barrio of Spain fourth with 19 each. Sixth place was a tie at 24 by De Luca, Gary Player of South Africa and Italo Aoki of Japan.
Taiwan, the defending champion, was in third place in team totals with 283 on Mr. Lu's 69 and a water-spattered 78 by Hsieh Min-Nan, who won the individual title last year in Melbourne.
Player and Hugh Baiocchi of South Africa carded 72 on Friday for a 2-0 team total and fourth place. Japan was fifth with 287, Spain sixth with 288, Thailand seventh with 289 and Puerto Rico eighth with 293.

San Diego OK'd To Keep Padres

SAN DIEGO (AP) — An all-California group that includes composer Bert Bacharach won approval Friday to buy the San Diego Padres and keep the National League team in San Diego.
After six weeks of intensive negotiations, Mayor Pete Wilson said the City Council approved a 15-year stadium lease. The agreement ended speculation that the Padres would be moved to Washington, D.C., under terms of a tentative sale announced this summer. San Diego threatened to sue for breaking the old, 20-year stadium lease if the club was moved.
Two months ago, Carl Smith agreed to the new sale, subject to approval of the stadium lease and ratification by the league. He has steadily lost money since 1969, when the expansion team was formed, because of what his spokesman has called too-tough terms of the lease and other problems.
The new group was identified by Wilson as Bacharach; majority owner Marjorie L. Everette of the Hollywood Park Race Track; Los Angeles grocer Tom Underwood; Mrs. Gene Washburn, who is Southern California distributor for 7-Up Bottling Co.; Dr. Bob Kerlan, and two other minority members.
Underwood, owner of Young's market and board chairman and chief executive officer of Hollywood Park, was designated as chairman of the Padres.
Kerlan is an orthopedic surgeon who works closely with Los Angeles professional sports teams.
No sale price was announced, although Smith paid \$10 million for the team and informed sources said he agreed to sell for "around" that same figure.

Monroe Academy Wins, 14-6; Ravenwood Title Hopes Die

PORSYTH, Ga. — A comeback effort by the Ravenwood Raiders fell short Friday night as their championship hopes were ended by Monroe Academy, 14-6.
It was heartbreaking loss for the Raiders, who had been a Class AA gridiron terror in the Southeastern Association of Independent Schools. The loss to Monroe leaves them with a respectable season's record of nine victories against three defeats.
The battle with Monroe could be described best as a real head-knocker — a toe-to-toe, nose-to-nose "physical" football game... hard-hitting from the start.
Although Monroe quickly jumped out front with a 7-0 lead, the game turned into a defensive standoff until the final quarter when Monroe scored again.
Even then, Ravenwood tried to pull it out after Clint Friedlander punched over from the two-yard line for Ravenwood's first touchdown.
Ravenwood's touchdown was set up on a beautiful 72-yard run by halfback Jerry Parker, who scooted to Monroe's one-yard line. Ravenwood was then thrown for a two-yard loss, but on the next play Friedlander plunged into the end zone.
Trying to close the gap, Ravenwood attempted a two-point conversion with Friedlander passing to Ken Stanauld. Stanauld caught the ball, but referee ruled he was outside the end zone.

Vandy Top Contender For SEC Cage Crown

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — If Vanderbilt can get effective work under the boards, the Commodores should be a strong contender for the Southeastern Conference basketball crown.
The only players missing from last year's team that finished 24-6 are Fred J. Steve Turner and Elmer H. Ray. Mauch, who alternated at center.
As a result, Coach Ray Skinner has made a switch that may be unique in college basketball history.
He's moved a guard to center. The player is Jan van Breda Kolff, who at 6 feet 7 was billed last year as the country's tallest collegiate guard.
"He certainly isn't the muscle-type center," said Skinner, dean of SEC coaches, "but otherwise he does a real job."
Van Breda Kolff, the son of the Memphis Tarns' coach, is a slender 185-pounder.
Seven of the 10 Sunday games are sellouts and thus will be televised locally. Television blackouts will remain in effect in New Orleans, Cleveland and Baltimore.
The Commodores open the season Dec. 1 at Rice and then move on to Texas Tech Dec. 3. They open at home Dec. 7 against Nebraska in the Vanderbilt Invitational Tournament. Middle Tennessee State and Tennessee State also are in the tourney.

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
